MSF urges India not to "cave to pressure" on affordable drugs, Business Standard

Charity Medecins Sans Frontieres appealed to India on Thursday not to give in to pressure from Europe, the United States and Japan to make it easier for big firms to get patents in the country, potentially blocking the production of cheap generics. MSF, also known as Doctors Without Borders, said changes proposed at negotiations for the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) trade agreement - of which India is a part - contain "damaging provisions, all of which go beyond India's obligations under international trade rules".

Drug to check cholesterol gets FDA panel nod, The Times of India

An expert committee that advises the Food and Drug Administration recommended on Wednesday that the agency approve the second in a new class of drugs that can drive cholesterol levels down to unheard-of levels. Cardiologists hope these new medicines will help prevent heart attacks for millions of Americans, but the results of clinical trials that will definitively settle the question of the drugs' effectiveness will not be in until 2017. The panel on Tuesday had advised the FDA to approve the first such drug, alirocumab, made by Sanofi and Regeneron Pharmaceuticals, and on Wednesday recommended approval for the second, a similar drug,

Maharashtra FDA conducts 122 raids in 2013-14 against only 49 in year 2012-13, Pharmabiz.com

In order to enhance enforcement for compliance of norms amongst retailers, wholesalers and manufacturers of pharmaceutical products, the Maharashtra Food and Drug Administration (FDA) conducted 122 raids in the year 2013-14 as compared to only 49 in the year 2012-13. The raids revealed rampant violations of Drugs and Cosmetics Act, 1940 and Rules, 1945 as offenders stocked drugs without license and sold them without purchase bills. Maharashtra FDA also cancelled licenses of 2,241 retail pharmacies and suspended licenses of another 1,857 retailers across the state for violation of Drugs & Cosmetics Act like dispensing medicines without prescription.

dna impact: FDA asks major manufacturer of albumin to increase production, DNA India

As dna reported, life-saving albumin is in short supply in Mumbai again. A day after dna published a report about the shortage of albumin in the city, the Food and Drugs Administration (FDA) has swung into action. FDA has asked the major albumin manufacturer in the state, Reliance Life Sciences, to increase the production of albumin and assured the company that it will get whatever help it needs in the matter. Reliance Life Sciences officials have informed the FDA that they currently produce 40,000 vials per month.

Health ministry to ask doctors to write prescription in capital letters, The Times of India
